





First Reading Acts 4:32-37

God had blessed the proclamation of the gospel richly in Jerusalem. Verse 4 of this chapter tells us that the church there had grown to 5,000 men. The total congregation was two or three times that number! A church that large is a challenge to lead and administer. Add to these challenges the fact that it was composed of both Jews and non-Jews. Yet that congregation enjoyed remarkably impressive unity. Their hearts and minds were one, united in their faith in Jesus Christ. That unity showed itself in a genuine and self-sacrificing care for each other. May the unity of faith and purpose God has worked among us here in our congregation also express itself in devotion to the apostles' teaching and to sacrificial giving to the proclamation of that message!



The whole group of believers was one in heart and soul. No one claimed that any of his possessions was his own, but they held everything in common. ³³ The apostles continued to testify about the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ with great power, and abundant grace was on all of them. ³⁴ There was not a needy person among them. For from time to time those who were owners of lands or houses sold them, brought the proceeds received from what was sold, ³⁵ and laid it at

the apostles' feet. It was distributed to each one according to what anyone needed.

³⁶ Joseph, who was called Barnabas by the apostles (which is translated "son of encouragement"), a Levite, a native of Cyprus, ³⁷ sold a field that belonged to him. He brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet.



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Second Reading

1 John 3:18-24

How can we know whether we are truly connected to Jesus as a branch is connected to the vine? 
Dear children, let us love not only with word or with our tongue, but also in action and truth.



"Stories They Probably Didn't Teach You in Sunday School"

Can you relate?

Your eyelids are getting heavy. It's not that the preacher is saying things that are uninteresting or not opening the Word up to you – it's rather that he has so <u>much</u> to say. He's been at it for a while now and you are starting to lose connection. It seems the harder you try to keep your eyes open, the harder it is. When that first nod hits, you try to disguise it a bit by acting like you are nodding in agreement or really focusing on what he's saying. And then it happens; the final "amen" of the sermon jolts you awake. The questions start running through your mind - "Did the preacher notice that I was sleeping?" "Did I snore at all?" "Did I mumble something in my sleep?"

Has that ever happened to you? Almost certainly, it has. Sometimes the environment just makes it hard to stay awake – it's warm, quiet, and safe. We don't get many moments like that in our work-a-day lives, so mind and body are a bit inclined to shut down. Sometimes it's the result of being up too late the night before: sick kids, a TV movie that ran a little long, out with friends a bit late, or just a really, really busy week – all that can set us up for having a hard time staying awake in church.

A pastor would be tempted to use this remarkable little story as a cautionary tale about the dangers of falling asleep in church – this story is about a young man who died because he did.

A church member might be tempted to see this story as confirming what many pewsitters have thought: long-winded preachers aren't good for you. This story is about a young man who actually died because the preaching went on for a long time.


In truth, this surprising little account tells us something about God's power at work. Let's take a closer look at the story of **Eutychus**, the boy who got preached to death and back again!

When and Where Are We?

On this third missionary journey, Paul pretty much retraced his steps from his second journey. He'd planted Christian congregations on that second trip, and how he was revisiting them to strengthen them, help them deal with issues they might be having, and to keep them focused in their primary task of proclaiming the gospel clearly.

This mission trip is covered in Acts 18:22-21:17. While we won't take time to read that entire account in our Bible class, it is worthy of a careful read. There is much to learn there about Paul's love for souls, the challenges of church planting across cultures, and faith-born courage in the face of opposition to the gospel.

On the map, you can follow Paul's route outbound from Antioch and finally returning to Jerusalem. The story of Eutychus takes place on the homebound trak in the city of Troas.

Here's What Happened:

"On the first day of the week, when we were gathered together to break bread, Paul spoke to the people. Since he intended to leave the next day, he continued talking until midnight. ⁸ There were many lamps in the upstairs room where we were gathered. ⁹ Seated in a window was a young man named Eutychus. He was sinking into a deep sleep as Paul kept on talking for a long time. When he was sound asleep, he fell down from the third story and was picked up dead. ¹⁰ Paul went down, bent over him, threw his arms around him, and said, 'Do not be alarmed, because he is alive!' ¹¹ Then he went upstairs, broke bread, and ate. After talking for a considerable time until dawn, he left. ¹² They brought the boy home alive and were greatly comforted."

Paul was in Troas for about a week. But it was with the congregation in Troas as with most congregations today, we have contact with most of our members on Sunday when we gather for worship. Paul and the members at Troas were determined to make the most of this limited opportunity before he left the next day.

As you read the account, what details do you notice that seem to have played a part in Eutychus falling asleep?

The Greek verb in verse 7 that describes what Paul was doing has been translated "preaching" or "speaking." If we hold to that translation, what strikes you about this entire incident?

The Greek verb in verse 7 is actually the Greek word from which the English word <u>dialogue</u> comes. What picture do you have of what Paul and those attending were doing?

What might this suggest as a way for preachers to make the proclamation of the Word of God more engaging?

This description helps us appreciate that in Paul's work as he planted and strengthened churches through the Word of God, he distinction between sermon and Bible class were rather blurred. Discuss: What can we do to try to foster a Sunday morning culture of growing in the Word more than a 15-20 minute sermon in one room and a 45-60 minute Bible study and discussion in another room?

The death and raising of Eutychus might sound a bit familiar. We've seen and heard things like this before.

Compare what Paul did with what Elijah did in Zarephath, Sidon in the Old Testament:

"Then he stretched himself out on the boy three times, and he cried out to the Lord, 'O Lord, my God, let this boy's soul return to his body!" ²² The Lord listened to Elijah's voice, and the boy's soul returned to his body, and he came to life. ²³ Then Elijah took the boy and brought him down to the house from his upstairs room, and he gave him to his mother. Elijah said, 'See, your son is alive!" (1 King 17:21-23)

- What is similar about the places where these occurred?
- What is similar about the manner in which the raising occurred?
- What is similar about the effect of that raising on people who saw it?

Compare what Paul said about Eutychus with what Jesus said about Jairus' daughter:

"As he was saying these things to them, there was a ruler who came, bowed down to him, and said, 'My daughter has just died. But come, place your hand on her, and she will live.' ¹⁹ Jesus got up and followed him, as did his disciples. ... ²³ When Jesus came into the ruler's house and saw the flute players and the noisy crowd, ²⁴ he said to them, 'Go away, for the girl is not dead but is sleeping.' But they laughed at him. ²⁵ When the crowd was sent out of the house, Jesus went in, took the girl by the hand, and she was raised." (Matthew 9)

- How could Paul mere man duplicate what Jesus the Son of God did?
- What do these incidents tell us about God's power over death?
- For some help, read 1 Corinthians 15:20-27 "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For since death came by a man, the resurrection of the dead also is going to come by a man. ²² For as in Adam they all die, so also in Christ they all will be made alive. ²³ But each in his own order: Christ

as the firstfruits and then Christ's people, at his coming. ²⁴Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has done away with every other ruler and every other authority and power. ²⁵For he must reign 'until he has put all his enemies under his feet.' ²⁶ Death is the last enemy to be done away with. ²⁷ Certainly, 'he has put all things in subjection under his feet."

Twice in this account, Paul and the members of the Troas church did something together – once when they first gathered and then again after Eutychus was raised. What was that?

Reflect and discuss: How is this reflected in our practice here at Ascension and why is that important?

Some have wanted to make this story about Eutychus an allegory about being spiritually sleepy. This is not an allegory; it was an actual historical event. Yet it can serve as a jumping off point for a discuss about something Jesus wrote to one of the church in Asia Minor, not far from Troas:

"To the messenger of the church in Sardis write:

The one who has the seven spirits of God and the seven stars says this:

I know your works. You have a reputation for being alive, but you are dead. ² Wake up, and strengthen what is left, which is about to die, for I have found that your works are not complete in the sight of my God. ³ Therefore remember what you received and heard. Hold on to it and repent! If you do not wake up, I will come like a thief, and you will not know at what time I will come upon you.

⁴Yet you have a few names in Sardis, people who have not defiled their clothes. They will walk with me in white clothing, for they are worthy.

⁵The one who is victorious in this way will be clothed in white clothing. I certainly will not erase his name from the Book of Life, and I will acknowledge his name before my Father and his angels.

⁶ Whoever has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches."


